### **PURPOSE:**

The Enlisted Association of the National Guard of Tennessee Auxiliary has established a scholarship program. If funds are available, one scholarship in the amount of \$500.00 will be awarded to the number one ranked applicant. The Katrina Tubbs-Grimes Scholarship is named after the daughter of Auxiliary member, Alice Tubbs, and EANGTN member, SFC Floyd Tubbs, Sr. (RET). Katrina was a generous, kind spirit with a brilliant mind for legal research. She was highly encouraged to complete her Law degree before her premature passing. It is the effort of the EANGTN Auxiliary to honor Mrs. Tubbs-Grimes' commitment to excellence in education by awarding one (1) scholarship to help further the education of an EANGTN Member or dependent per academic year.

### **ELIGIBILITY:**

An applicant must be a member, in good standing, of the EANGTN Auxiliary or the dependent child/stepchild of an EANGTN Auxiliary member. Each applicant must inform the Scholarship Committee by letter and application with specific facts as to his/her desire to continue his/her education and why financial assistance is required. Applicants are required to submit their letters of recommendation verifying the application and giving general personality/character traits. Applicants must have participated in school/civic activities. The Scholarship Committee will confirm each applicant's eligibility and then grade upon listed criteria. The applicant scoring the highest will be awarded a \$500 scholarship, given funds are available.
